Einstein's Story

Einstein is a 4 year old, 6 pound Japanese Chin.



We first met him a couple years back when he was rescued from a puppy mill, severely malnourished. He had almost no coat, weighed about 3 pounds, and was badly emaciated. We called him Einstein because the only fur he had was a patch that stuck straight up on the top of his head....just like Albert Einstein! He was nursed back to health and was eventually adopted out to a wonderful man. After about a year and a half with his new daddy, he had to be returned to the rescue. His dad had sustained a severe brain trauma which resulted in him loosing his home and being unable to care for himself or Einstein.

I called Einstein Tiny Einey, and he is. He is

the funniest dog I have ever had the pleasure to have in my home. He will not walk on wood or stairs. If I go upstairs and forgot him, he will stand at the bottom, still on the carpet and bark until someone comes back to carry him up to where we are.

Einstein LOVES food, the second he hears that dog food being opened he is the first to run over. Barking and spinning in circles just waiting for you to put it down for him. Eggs and cheese are his favorite meal. This was started when he was first rescued from the puppy mill and a treat he still loves. He spins so much I almost worry about the day he finally unwinds.

He is the sweetest little guy too. He loves to just lay in your lap and be petted, or even just to be sitting there with you, he is content. Einstein also likes to sleep in bed with us, but he also likes his space! He talks A LOT, you can ask him a question and he will

growl back at you in all these different tones. I often think that he is actually talking to us. At night, once he finds his comfy spot in bed, he does not like to be moved. If I move him, or intrude into his space, he tells me all about it. It is so cute.

A few weeks ago, Einstein started having trouble walking and was vomiting a bit. We took him into the vet and they determined he had a ruptured disk in his neck, leaking fluid into his spinal chord which was causing him a lot of pain. Two weeks ago Monday, he began throwing up a lot and not eating. By Wednesday he was really not doing well and we took him back to the vet. They took x-rays, said they did not see anything and sent him home with antibiotics. The following morning he was still throwing up, now wouldn't drink and could not walk. I got him to a different vet right away. This vet looked at the xrays and took more of their own to verify. She told us that Einstein had an obstruction in his intestines and took him into emergency surgery. More than 2 hours later

Einstein emerged from surgery, the obstruction was a large piece of cloth with plastic in it.

Surgery was very hard for him, he crashed numerous times, and the vet and her team had to work hard to keep his blood pressure above 20. That night, the doctor and I sat with him all night long. His temperature was only 94 degrees, his blood pressure was wavering between 20 and 80, his proteins and glucose were low. Things were not looking good.

Friday night Einstein was transferred to a 24 hour clinic for careful weekend monitoring. By the time he was transferred, things were looking better and we finally believed that he was going to make it.

His vitals were stable, his protein levels were holding and he was focusing on me. Saturday he began moving around, he even got up and tried to come to be when I walked in to visit him. We had rounded a corner and soon I was going to be able to take him home with me, maybe give him some eggs and cheese in bed.

Einstein's ordeal as come with a vet bill that exceeds \$5000. CSDR has a very limited budget and this bill has hit us hard. We have set up a special fund, The Einstein Fund, to cover this expense. A few days after the writing of this story, Einstein's liver began to fail. The obstruction in his intestines and bowels had just been there to long. It had blocked oxygen and blood to the liver, causing to much damage for him to recover from. We let Einstein go around 9am on August 9th. He was in too much pain to continue to make him suffer, and his body was slowly shutdown. I held him and told him how much I

ting down. I held him and told him how much I loved him while he went to Heaven and Einstein is no longer in any pain.

Einstein was such a fighter, I knew every time I looked into his eyes that he was fighting for me. He made it through so much in his short life. Every possible thing that could have been done once the obstruction was found, was done, it was just too late for my sweet baby. I know he will be waiting for me, playing with our other little ones who have gone to Rainbow Bridge, but until then, I will miss and love him every day.




